

Sunday Scriptural Reflection

Palm/Passion Sunday ~ April 5, 2020

Matthew 21:1-11 Philippians 2:6-11 Isaiah 50:4-7 26:14-27:66

The biblical accounts of the events leading up to, and including, the death of Jesus are rich in references to the Hebrew Scriptures. Like the infancy narratives, the accounts of the passion and death of Jesus either quote directly or echo the Old Testament in almost every verse. This final week of Lent is a good time to reflect on the Christian use of the Jewish Scriptures to interpret the actions and passion of Jesus.

Over the years, it has gradually come home to me that there are two misguided ways to interpret Old Testament allusions and citations in the New Testament. The first wrong way is simply to take an Old Testament reference as a claim that a prediction came true. This bald prediction/fulfillment approach reduces the meaning of the reference to the simple thought: the Old Testament says such and such, and look, it happened in Jesus' life. Granted that this was often the way those references were treated in the apologetics of another age, this way of thinking rarely does justice to the implied intentions of the biblical authors, and these intentions vary according to context.

The other misguided way of interpreting the New Testament references to the Hebrew Scriptures is the hypothesis of some skeptical biblical critics who assume the details of the passion were simply invented by authors using the Old Testament as their source. This hardly makes sense as the practice of people proclaiming Good News.

What, then, is the best way to understand the New Testament references to the Old Testament? It is to take those references one by one, looking in each case for the way in which the older text is used to interpret the meaning of the life and person of Jesus. This Sunday's readings provide a number of fascinating examples. Let's consider two of them.

Zech 9:9 at Matt 21:5

Behold, your king comes to you, meek and riding on an ass, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden.

Mark and Luke tell of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem without quoting this explanatory verse from the prophet Zechariah. All of the Synoptic Gospels are clear that Jesus' choice of the donkey as his mount for entering Jerusalem was quite deliberate. The move is so carefully prearranged that one suspects that it is some kind of prophetic symbolic action – like the table fellowship with outcasts or the sharing of the cup of blessing. Matthew makes the meaning of the choice evident by citing Zechariah 9:9, which is part of a portrait of a future king who rides a donkey instead of a war horse, a peacemaking king who bans the bow and the chariot. (The Fourth Gospel will clarify the meaning even further, not only by quoting the prophet but also by showing Jesus choosing to ride the donkey in response to the palm-waving of the crowds.) Notice that the citation of Zechariah is more than a matter of highlighting a fulfilled prediction; it explains the meaning of the action.

Wis 2:16-18 at Mt 27:43. To Mark's description of the passers-by and the chiefpriests and scribes taunting the crucified Jesus to save himself and come down from the cross, Matthew adds some words. "Let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him," say the passers-by. And the Temple officials add the barb,

He trusted in God; let him deliver him now if he wants him. For he said, I am the Son of God.

This Matthean addition is a paraphrase of Wisdom 2:17-18, whose context is a description of a group of wicked men who think that might makes right (Wis 2:11) ganging up on a just man and speaking cynically among themselves:

He boasts that God is his Father.

Let us see whether his words are true. ...

For if the just one be the son of God,

he will defend him and deliver him from the hand of his foes. This allusion to the Old Testament is clearly not a matter of

prediction and fulfillment. For the author of Wisdom, it is a perennial



The Pastor's Ponderings

This weekend **we celebrate Palm Sunday**—recalling Jesus joyful entry into Jerusalem. It also signals the beginning of Holy Week. Due to the CORIV-19 pandemic **all services will only be available via livestream—no congregation allowed**. Also, services will be modified somewhat due to that fact. We received many pages of 'directives' on Holy Week Services from the Chancery Office.

At the **Palm Sunday Mass** (6:30 pm Saturday evening) I will bless the palms. *On Sunday morning I will place them on a table in the lobby for individuals to pickup – if desired.*

- Palms will be in a sealed bag on the table
- You are asked to use hand sanitizer BEFORE opening the bag
- Grab a palm or two
- Reseal the bag with the twist tie
- Use hand sanitizer AGAIN before you leave.
- Keep 6 feet apart from any others who may be there.

We will be webcasting live the Holy Week Services and posting it for later viewing on our webpage www.GetSHC.org. Check the full Holy Week schedule located within this week's bulletin.

Sadly, the Saturday 6:30 pm Parish Mass is closed to the public. No more than 10 people are allowed to gather – that means a lector, music person, a video operator and myself will normally be the only people at the Mass.

scenario. As applied to Jesus, the reference is a reflection on the meaning of the drama that Jesus plays out, for the Wisdom passage also comments on the delusion of the abusers of the just man:

These were their thoughts, but they erred; for their wickedness blinded them,

And they knew not the hidden counsels God, neither did they count on a recompense of holiness, nor discern the innocent souls reward. ... (Wis 2:21-22).

Thus Matthew enlists the Wisdom text not as prediction but as illumination.

These examples are just a hint of the wealth of meaning that lies behind the echoes of Scripture in the passion account.

Holy Week Service Schedule Special Directives from Bishop DeGrood

due to the CORVID-19 pandemic

All Holy Week Masses will be offered without a congregation present.

All Masses will be webcast @ GetSHC.org at 6:30 pm Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Special Directives have been issued by Bishop DeGrood for Holy Week services. These directives countermand the usual liturgical directives for these services.

PALM SUNDAY MASS. ... Saturday, April 4 @ 6:30 pm

Blessed palms can be made available after the Palm Sunday Mass is completed – under no circumstance are they to be handed out! They can be placed on a table in the lobby to be picked up by parishioners at their convenience.

HOLY THURSDAY MASS. . Thursday, April 9 @ 6:30 pm

Special Directive:

- 1. The church is to be locked beforehand. Please notify parishioners the doors will be locked when normally they would be open. They are not to be reopened for the traditional adoration following the Mass.
- 2. Washing of the Feet is to be omitted.
- 3. The usual procession with the Blessed Sacrament to a place of repose is to be omitted and the Blessed Sacrament should be kept in the tabernacle. There is no Altar of Repose.

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE. . . Friday, April 10 @ 6:30 pm

Special Directive:

- 1. Veneration of the Holy Cross takes place by those present with a simple genuflection or bow; the Cross is not to be reverenced with
- 2. A special commemoration in the General Intercessions for an End to the Pandemic, developed by the Office of Divine Worship, is to be included.

EASTER VIGIL MASS. ... Saturday, April 11 @ 6:30 pm

Special Directive:

- 1. The preparation and lighting of the fire is to be omitted.
- 2. The Paschal Candle is lit without procession followed by the Easter Proclamation – the Exultet.
- 3. The Baptismal Liturgy is only the Renewal of Baptismal Promises; a symbolic (small) amount of Holy Water may be blessed but holy water fonts are to remain empty.
- 5. The Rite of Christian Initiation and/or the Reception into Full **Communion will be postponed.** Once restrictions on public Masses have been lifted, pastors will retain the faculty to receive and confirm candidates at a time when family and friends may be present.
- 6. The Renewal of the Baptismal Promises the homily.

EASTER CONFESSION OPPORTUNITIES

- * If you are sick or someone in your home is sick STAY HOME!
- * Gettysburg Confessions will be held in church using the existing confessional - BEHIND THE SCREEN ONLY - while waiting - 6 feet of separation must be maintained from any members of a different household. No more than 10 persons should be in the church at a time.
- Onida Confessions will be held in the SACRISTY BEHIND THE SCREEN ONLY - while waiting -6 feet of separation must be maintained from any members of a different household. No more than 10 persons should be in the church at a time.

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

There is no obligation to provide regular times for confession during this pandemic. If pastors choose to do so, they must impose social distancing guidelines. Confessionals may not be appropriate for use at this time due to the proximity of the priest to the penitent. In which case, another suitable space where the priest and penitent can be separated within a safe distance should be used. If confessions are being held, pastors must inform parishioners when lining up awaiting confession to keep a space six feet apart from each other. Reminders about social distancing should be posted. Remind the faithful that they can complete their Easter Duty anytime up to and including Trinity Sunday.

SPECIAL INDULGENCE (CCC 1471-1473)

The Apostolic Penitentiary, with the approval of the Holy Father, has granted additional opportunities for one to gain a plenary indulgence during this time of the COVID-19 pandemic once per day. This plenary indulgence is to "all the faithful affected by the COVID-19 disease, as well as to health care workers, family members and all those who, for whatever reason, even with prayer, take care of them."

The following requirements are in effect to obtain the indulgence:

- 1. Be detached from all sin, even venial, otherwise the indulgence is only partial.
- 2. Undertake at least one of the following spiritual good works:
 - a. Spiritually unite through the media to the celebration of the Holy Mass;
 - b. Recitation of the Holy Rosary;
 - c. The pious practice of the Way of the Cross
 - d. Recite the Creed, the Our Father and a pious invocation to the Blessed Virgin:
 - e. Make a visit to the Blessed Sacrament:
 - f. Undertake Eucharistic Adoration,
 - g. The reading of the Holy Scriptures for at least half an hour:
 - h. Recitation of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy.
- 3. When undertaking any of the good works mentioned above, "implore from Almighty God the cessation of the epidemic, relief for those who are afflicted and eternal salvation of those who have died."
- 4. Have the intention to fulfill as soon as it is possible the usual obligations of sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father.
